## Social Narrative: A Visit to the CAT Museum









Today I will be visiting the Cafesjian Art Trust Museum to look at art.

The Cafesjian Art Trust Museum is also known as the CAT Museum. It was opened a few years ago to share one man's private art collection with members of the public like me.

When I arrive at the CAT Museum, I will enter through the front doors and walk down the entrance hallway. I will see colorful windows and bright lights.



I will check in at the front desk. A museum staff person will ask my grown-up for our names and check us off the list.



Food and drink is not allowed inside the gallery exhibition space where the art is displayed. If I need to drink water or eat a snack, I can do that in the lobby before I go in the gallery to see the art.


I may have to wait for a few minutes for my tour to begin. While I am waiting, I can sit on the couches in the lobby.



While I am waiting, I can also use the books in the library. I can take books off the shelves to look at them. I will leave them on the big library table when I am done.

I can only touch the books. I cannot touch any of the art sitting on the shelves or displayed on the walls.


If I need a fidget to keep my hands busy while I'm at the museum, I can ask a museum staff person for one. I can also borrow headphones or sunglasses while I am visiting.



I may need to use the toilet before my tour starts. The toilets in the bathroom do not automatically flush.

When I am ready to wash my hands, I can use the plastic stool stored under the sink if I need help reaching the faucet. The soap I will use has a strong perfume smell.


The faucets are automatic, and the water is not too hot and not too cold. I will dry my hands with paper towels. The bathrooms do not have electric hand dryers.



When my tour is ready to start, I will gather with the rest of the group. There may be as many as 25 other people on the tour with me.

A friendly tour guide will tell us about the artwork. The tour guide will explain what we are going to see and remind us of the museum rules.


I will remember not to touch the art. I will walk slowly and carefully. I will speak quietly, using my inside voice. I will listen when others are speaking.



The tour guide will lead us into the gallery to see the art. If I feel tired, I can sit on a bench. I won't rest my body or my arms on the cases that hold the art.

The museum gallery has bright lights and it may get loud when other people on my tour are talking.

While I am in the gallery, I can talk about what I see with my grown-up and my tour guide. I can ask questions and make observations. I can share my ideas!



I will stay with the group during the tour. If I need to leave early or to take a break, I can go with my grown-up into the lobby.

If I need a quiet, private space, I can ask a museum staff person to show me where the sensory-friendly room is.

When I am ready to leave the CAT Museum, I will tell my grown-up.
